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My Canyon Lake, "Canyon Lake Library Wins Night Sky Award for fighting Light Pollution"

The Rotary Club of Canyon Lake and the Comal County Friends of the Night Sky presented a Night Sky Friendly Business Certificate to Tye Preston Memorial Library for keeping the night lights low around its building and grounds. The library also received a copy of <u>Cassandra and the Night Sky</u>, a children's book published by a member of Friends of the Night Sky.

Rotarian Maureen Schein said her organization will continue to partner with Friends of the Night Sky to recognize area businesses that avoid needless lighting at night.

Larry Wells, founder of Comal County Friends of the Night Sky, told MyCanyonLake.com last year that one of his group's sayings is "one light at a time, and we've turned out some lights." The organization advocates for outdoor lighting fixtures and practices and following updated guidelines and using available technologies for efficient, non-intrusive lighting. Wells said one of the reasons Canyon Lake residents don't see many fireflies is that it's too bright for the insects - They can't see each other in the glow of artificial lights.

"Austin is coming from the east and San Antonio from the south," according to Blanco County's Friends of the Night Sky group. "We can still see the stars, for now, but the day is coming when that may no longer be the case. Unless we act. This is why we're here...development is inevitable, but development with an eye on the heavens can give us all good lives enriched even further by being able to look up and see the stars."

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Community Impact, "City of New Braunfels submits application for grant funding to support Comal River improvements"

The New Braunfels City Council on Oct. 25 approved the submission of an application for \$1.5 million in grant funding that would be used for improvements on the Comal River.

The grant is part of the American Rescue Plan Act Travel, Tourism and Outdoor Recreation funding opportunity offered by the Economic Development Administration and the U.S. Department of Commerce.

City staff submitted the application in hopes of receiving funding that would be used to construct an underwater landing and an inclined elevator at the last tuber's exit on the Comal River. The landing would provide people with a place to stand as they wait to ascend the stairs from the river to East Lincoln Street.

City documents show the total cost of the landing is estimated to be \$1.5 million, though the cost could change as the project is currently in the design phase. Read more at: https://communityimpact.com/austin/new-braunfels/parks-recreation/2021/10/27/

Flat Creek had always been translucent, flowing clear and cold through Kathleen Wilson's 15-Acre spread in the Texas Hill Country. Then something changed. The dust was the first sign. "That was really the first noticeable thing, the whole surface was covered with dust," said Wilson, 63, who runs an eco-friendly bed and breakfast on the Blanco County property. "You'd stick your hand in and it would, like, stick to you."

Soon the water was chocked with "mucky, nasty stuff," Wilson said. "It was never dirty before. This is a spring fed creek." The source of the problem: a limestone and caliche quarry four miles south of Wilson's land, near the headwaters of the creek. Read more at:

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Community Impact, "6,000 home Mayfair Development to break ground in early 2022"

Mayfair, a 1,888-acre mixed use development slated to be built over the course of 15-20 years, is on track to break ground soon as developers finalize agreements with the city and other entities.

The project, which has the potential to bring thousands of new residents to the New Braunfels area over the next 20 years, could break ground as early as the first quarter of 2022 pending the approval of a utility agreement with New Braunfels Utilities, said Thad Rutherford, CEO of SouthStar Communities, the development company behind Mayfair.

Mayfair is located in the extraterritorial jurisdiction, or ETJ, of New Braunfels on property that was previously owned by the Texas General Land Office, Rutherford said. Over the next 15 years, SouthStar is anticipated to build up to 6,000 new residences that will

include single family homes, townhomes and multifamily units. Homes will span a range of price points and will include affordable and workforce housing.

"This isn't just another housing subdivision," Rutherford said. "We're going to have some potential for industrial or data centers or other things that will only benefit the city of New Braunfels from an economic standpoint." Read about it at:
